RURAL HEALTH CARE IN CRISIS

Central Algoma – In a letter dated February 4, 2009, Sault Area Hospital CEO Ron Gagnon, and Board Chair Elaine Pitcher notified central Algoma municipalities that southern-Ontario based consulting firm Geyer & Associates had recommended the closure of the Matthews Memorial Hospital in Richards Landing effective April 2010.

Matthews Memorial Hospital (MMH) provides 24-hour emergency and out-patient service to the residents on St. Joseph Island and the central Algoma District between Bruce Mines and Echo Bay. In addition to emergency treatment, the hospital has two, 24-hour observation beds for patient assessment and stabilization. The beds are also used for patients to rest while receiving outpatient treatments. While an independent, full-ser-

vice facility for many decades, MMH has been operating as a satellite facility of Sault Area Hospital (SAH) in Sault Ste. Marie since 1984.

SAH Officials have stated no final decision will be made on this and approximately 80 other recommendations until management and senior staff have completed an impact analysis. SAH is facing a projected total deficit of \$12.6 million for fiscal 2008/09 (including an operating deficit of \$10.8 million) and long-term debt of approximately \$15 million. The government of Ontario has mandated that SAH present a balanced budget to the North East Local Health Integration Network (LHIN) by March 31, 2010.

Estimated annual operating costs of the MMH facility is \$800,000-850,000. Hospital data shows approximately 2300 to 2500 emergency room visits to MMH each year.

Island Insight

[Edited and abridged due to space limitations]

I retired to this island as have many others. Two of the main features for coming here were the convenience of the hospital and access to doctors here. Most seniors require more care as time marches on. Closure of our hospital or reduction in services would put people in a position of being at least 50 km from any health care or services, including for emergencies. Without the hospital, there will be an exodus of people to Sault Ste. Marie, as their lives could be in jeopardy.

There were 2500 residents treated in emergency last year. What would be the cost to the health system for ambulance services for half of those emergencies which the hospital now services, and how many would not make it there alive?

Matthews is only one percent of the Sault Area Hospital's budget. There are waits of eight to ten hours in emergency there now. What will the increase in wait time be if they are servicing an additional 7,000 people?

People continually complain about the lack of funding to our health care system, but I honestly feel the problem is simply that dollars are not being used efficiently. We began paying health tax three or four years ago to improve our health care system. Where are those dollars? Did the system improve? No, it has become much worse. We have become accustomed to throwing money at things, thinking it will fix the problem.

I would like to know what the ratio is of administrative salaries to other expenses. Sault Area Hospital is paying twenty people in administration six figure incomes. They should look at the waste at the top of the tree and cut salaries in this area first, plus eliminate positions, if they can not even balance the budget. I am told that the CEO is paid more than the Prime Minister of Canada and crying the blues about lack of funding.

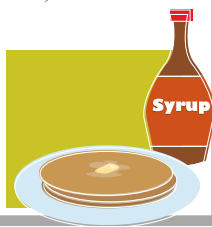

Question: We gave our youngest a brand new iPod nano music player for Christmas. It's been a disaster. The iPod came with no manual or instructions. He had to ask friends to load music. Then, the iPod went through the wash in his jeans pocket. Help!

Answer: iPods can go through the wash and survive, although it's not a recommended way to clean them. Let the unit dry thoroughly before using again. The iPod ships with a CD which contains a setup program which should facilitate installing on a home computer. This CD also has a complete manual. Printed manuals are never included. If this CD is ever lost, go to the iPod support website for an up-to-date downloadable manual. The iPod support website has a FAQ (frequently asked question) area and a very popular troubleshooting section for those really rough times. This iPod nano which was purchased recently is a fourth generation design. The Apple Corp. designed this newest iPod to be the best ever. The sealed shell is constructed of aluminum and glass, is barely a 1/4 inch thick and has a wide range of colours. The 8 gigabyte model will store 2,000 songs or 8 hours of video. The internal motion sensor is a bit disconcerting. Flip the iPod sideways and the viewer window automatically displays in landscape.

Hold upright and the display returns to portrait mode. Shake the iPod nano to shuffle music selections. Personally, I would disable the shake to shuffle feature. There are no large, protruding buttons to snag on clothes. A dark ring, called the click wheel, and a single, flush-mounted center button are the only visible controls. There's no on/off button. Press any button to turn on your iPod nano. To turn off, press and hold the Play/Pause segment of the click wheel. Use the Hold switch to disable the motion sensor and all controls. The controls are extremely touch sensitive. Add the motion sensor and this unit can be very frustrating. Do use the Hold switch at all times to avoid inadvertent changes. The volume control is incorporated into the click wheel. Drag your finger around the center wheel to increase or decrease volume. The CD provides the iTunes program for loading the iPod. Upgrades for iTunes can be downloaded using high-speed Internet. Tracks from your personal music CDs or songs purchased on-line can be converted into the iTunes/iPod proprietary format. Parents, take an interest in this new technology. Print the pages explaining the main iPod controls and familiarize yourself with typical operation. Then, help your son or daughter unravel this gadget.

The next thing to look at is the people who go into hospital for simple surgery or something similar but come in contact with bacteria, causing a life threatening infection and remaining hospitalized for weeks or months instead of a few days. The enemy here are viruses and bacteria. Has anyone seen any improvement in this area? Until this problem is addressed, we will continue to keep putting out the fires, instead of preventing the fire in the first place.

All staff at the hospital should have duty clothes and shoes, which never leave the hospital. Staff should change into street clothing when their shifts are over, plus uniforms and shoes should be cleaned on-site for the next shift. I do not know when they ceased doing this, but they should not have.

The next area of waste is food. How in heaven's name do we expect patients to quickly become well enough to be released when food is served that has no nutrition? Probably eighty percent of the meal trays delivered go back not touched. I recall some years ago while working in the downtown area that people used to go to the cafeteria at the hospital for lunch. The food was so excellent and inexpensive. Why did that stop?



The Hilton Beach Recreation Committee's 7th Annual **Chocolate Everything** event last Sunday offered something to tempt everyone.

As for our small Matthews Memorial Hospital, it is clean and neat as a pin. Patients there are given good, fresh food made on site. It is an invaluable asset and should be a model for Sault Area Hospital.

Perhaps the study was necessary, however Matthews and Thessalon hospitals service 13,000 people on St. Joseph Island and the north shore. We should be entitled to receive the health tax back for our individual servicing hospitals and doctors, which I calculate to be \$650 per person. Matthews could also be operated as half emergency plus be expanded to give extra critical care beds or temporary long-term care for people waiting for openings in assisted living facilities or nursing homes.

I would like to see all levels of government get away from meddling in the business sector and look after the job of delivering service to the people in this country. Deliver healthcare, education and transportation; stop taking from the poor and giving to the rich. Stop taking away more and more from the rural area. We deserve as much as people in major centres, plus cost a lot less.

From the Lions Den

“Australian Disaster”

Lions Clubs International Foundation is working with local Lions to respond to the devastating bush wildfires that spread across southern Australia. Our thoughts are with Lions and those affected by this tragedy. Police have so far confirmed 181 deaths as the fires ripped across the southern state of Victoria, but the final death toll is expected to be well over 200 people, as many remain missing. We are saddened to learn that three Marysville Lions Club members are among the deceased and four others remain missing. More than 900 houses were destroyed and some 7,000 people have appealed for assistance.

LCIF has awarded \$30,000 in emergency grants to Districts 201-V3, V5 and V14. LCIF has established an “Australian Wildfire Disaster” designed fund for donors wishing to contribute directly to

this disaster. The funds will be used by Lions in Australia to provide relief supplies to displaced families and assist in rebuilding efforts.

Lions throughout Australia are responding and have launched their Lions Alert Program.

The Australian Lions Foundation has donated \$25,000 for relief as well as posted a list of needs and an appeal for additional assistance on their Web site at <http://www.lionsclubs.org.au/alf/>

Lions have in place arrangements for clean up work, personal assistance to victims, fencing, livestock fodder and other areas as they arise.

All Districts in MD201 have started district appeals and funds, clothing, and other relief supplies are being channeled through the “V” Districts as quickly as possible. “WE SERVE”
