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Wayne and Wendy Leave MMHA Board

IT'S NOT NEWS THAT THE Matthews Memorial Hospital Association's Board of Directors must deal with a wide variety of ailments, both chronic and acute in their nature. It simply comes with the turf, so to speak.

Since being elected at the 2011 MMHA Annual General Meeting last January, the new Board wasted no time in getting organized and wading into the challenges, and it appears that they've steadily been gaining ground on the many issues facing MMHA.

But sometimes the challenge comes unplanned and unexpectedly from within, and this new Board is no exception. Last week, Board Chair Wayne Arthur and his wife Wendy Gray, also a Director, resigned their positions on the MMHA board.

At least outwardly, it was, if there truly is such a thing, an amicable parting of ways. There were no violent clashes, no nasty or heated exchanges. It all boiled down to a difference in vision about the Board's governance practices – and at its heart, the highly touchy subject of whether or not Board meetings should be open or closed to the public.

"It was my hope to establish a governance framework to allow the Board of Directors to conduct the affairs of the Association in as orderly, effective and efficient manner as possible." Wayne clarifies. "As part of that initiative, I researched into the proper protocols for the Board of Director meetings, specifically those meetings designated as "closed" or "in-camera". I discovered that the Corporations Act, the Letters Patent, the Bylaws and Robert's Rules of Order do not compel or allow for attendance at Board meetings for other than Directors of the Board."

Wayne quickly assures us that his motivation was to achieve clarity and efficiency, rather than foster a sense of secrecy or exclusion. "That said, I felt a responsibility to inform the

members of MMHA as well as the public as to the Board's activities, initiatives and ideas." he continued. "It was my hope to have quarterly member/public meetings to discuss issues and initiatives with those in attendance."

Although Wendy fully supports the proposed policy, the rest of the Board did not feel that they could support a policy of 'closed' meetings, nor would the community at large. The potential for harming MMHA's vital community support and fundraising efforts was seen as outweighing any possible benefits of operating in 'closed session', which the public might view as 'in secret'.

"I believe that the Board of Directors requires the ability to meet and freely discuss the affairs of the Association at their meetings without the added element of public scrutiny." said Wayne in counterpoint. "It is my view that if the Board of Directors is not allowed to have free discussion, a lack of transparency ensues with decisions being made outside of the Board meetings without proper discussion inside of the meetings."


"As I have a strong need to conduct business as according to the ranking order of rules and also do not want to be responsible for a lack of donations, I decided it would be best for the Association and the community for me to step down." he concluded.

Sharing and supporting Wayne's concern, Wendy too opted to step down. "We both felt that we needed to do that." she tells us. "Contrary to what the name suggests, a closed meeting can still have guests in attendance, but we understand the concerns." she adds.

Both are quick to assure us that they continue to totally support MMHA and its Board, as it continues to face its challenges. "Our healthcare needs all the help it can get, and we'll still be here to share in the efforts!" states Wendy firmly and positively.

In the meantime, the Board is re-structuring, electing Arthana Hecker as the new Chair, and John Shannon as Vice-Chair. Although the Board could appoint replacements for the two now-vacant "North Shore" Directorships, it feels it more appropriate to have the Association membership decide who should fill those seats.

A General Meeting is planned for Monday, May 7th, in order to provide a "Community Update" and at that time, elections will be conducted for the vacant Directorships. Arrangements for the meeting are not yet finalized but watch the Island Clippings for further information as it develops.



If you are a "North Shore" resident of the Matthews Memorial Hospital catchment area and an MMHA member in good standing, and wish to stand for election, please contact Board Chair Arthena Hecker at 705 246-2377.

Like any corporation or government body, the Board may still, from time to time, go into closed session to deal with specific confidential issues, such as legal or employee matters, after which it must return to an 'open' meeting.

Arthena hastens to quell any possible confusion on that front: "Let there be no doubt that the public IS welcome to attend any MMHA Board meeting!" she states firmly. "Board meetings are usually held on the second Monday of each month at the St. Joseph Township Council Chambers, although our next meeting will be on April 2nd, due to the 9th being Easter Monday. The next, after that, will be May 14th."

In the meantime, the issues haven't gone away and the job remains to be done. Nothing in this world is really 'forever'. It appears that the MMHA Board and Wayne and Wendy haven't completely parted ways. They're all still moving in the one direction that they must – forward!

We wish them all the best of success.


Judy Ingram, one of the organizing team tells us "our work crew spent all day Friday getting the tent and everything set up for Saturday morning, only to awaken to 3" of water on the ice in the tent and rising, with plywood floating on the water." Each time we drilled a new fishing hole, the water level in the tent increased, due to the snow load on the ice."

And that wasn't their only problem. They couldn't simply re-schedule the event because of weather and the calendar. "The weather forecast for Saturday night and Sunday was cold and freezing temperatures, so we couldn't risk not being able to get everything off the ice again. The tent would have frozen in." says Judy. "There was another derby the next weekend, then March Break, and by then the ice might not be adequate."

So it came down to a simple, but sad decision: "We couldn't keep the children warm or feed them in the tent, so it was with great sadness that we cancelled it for this year."

But there was still some good news for the participants. "We did have over 70 children come, who we registered and gave prize packages to." she smiles. "A few stayed and fished anyway, and we provided the minnows!"

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

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

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Update on Blood Services Clinics

Thanks to Lavera Crack and Jody Wildman for providing an update on how the special blood services program for non-rostered patients is doing so far.

THE INTERIM SERVICE was initiated in early February through a joint agreement between the Central Algoma Rural Healthcare Steering Committee (CARHSC), the North East Local Health Integration Network (NE LHIN) and LifeLabs Medical Laboratory Services, as a response to the needs of local patients who:

- Are not registered patients of the Sault Area Hospital
- Are not registered patients of the medical clinics on St. Joseph Island, in Bruce Mines or Thessalon, and
- Cannot easily access the LifeLabs bloodwork clinics in Sault Ste. Marie.

LifeLabs' March 12th Report on Participation at both clinics shows the following attendance:

February 8	Thessalon (8), St. Joseph Island (10)
February 15	Thessalon (10), St. Joseph Island (10)
February 22	Thessalon (3), St. Joseph Island (11)
February 29	Thessalon (1), St. Joseph Island (11)
March 7	Thessalon (2), St. Joseph Island (12)

The low turnouts in Thessalon may be due to confusion about that clinic's location, when a flu outbreak at Algoma Manor forced a temporary move to another building. With usage of the Thessalon clinic so low, LifeLabs informally adjusted their times, enabling them to spend a bit more time at the St. Joseph Island clinic.

The initial usage of the St. Joseph Island Clinic is, not surprisingly, primarily people with Island and Desbarats addresses. According to LifeLabs, everything is going well. To date, no one has been turned away (either due to not enough time or not meeting the criteria). LifeLabs has been quite happy with the response and how cooperative the patients have been.

LifeLabs have also suggested they go a couple more weeks without a contract to see how the numbers go. Representatives of the Central Algoma Rural Health Care Committee will meet again with LifeLabs in the first week of April to re-evaluate the program's progress and options.

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
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Rev. Peter Hill Remembered

Gloria Riddell shares this remembrance of Rev. Peter Hill who passed away Christmas morning. "He was our Anglican Minister in the 70's. He also taught at CASS," she explains. "Peter touched the hearts of many in our area, both through the church and the school. He was well respected and loved by parishioners and students. We were lucky enough to have Peter as our guest speaker a couple of years ago at our church's 125th Anniversary. He was loved and will be missed."

Rev. Peter Hill, beloved spiritual leader of Christ Church Windermere since 1994, passed away peacefully early Christmas morning surrounded by his family. He was 71. He is survived by his loving wife and best friend of 50 years, Nancy, his three sons and six grandchildren.



After serving as a Curate at St. John's Church in Thunder Bay, he became the Rector of St. Joseph Island Anglican Parish, and taught at Central Algoma Secondary School. He later served as Chaplain, teacher and Housemaster at Trinity College School in Port Hope, before becoming Headmaster of Queen Margaret's School in Duncan B.C. Latterly, he served as Chaplain and teacher at Royal St. George's College in Toronto. On his retirement in 1999, he and Nancy built a new home near Windermere.

Rev. Hill's background attests to the fact that he was the epitome of what an Anglican Priest should strive to be. At his ordination, he was called on "to work as a pastor, priest and teacher and to love and serve the people among whom you work". Not only did he fulfill these promises, after retiring he worked tirelessly at Christ Church as a volunteer, refusing any payment. He was also an Associate Priest of the Parish of St. Stephen.

His funeral service took place on Thursday, January 5, 2012.

Because of Peter Hill's exemplary life, it's not hard to imagine the Lord saying to him on Judgment Day: "Well done, good and faithful servant".
