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Winter Arrives in Algoma

IT WASN'T OUR FAULT ... honest! It really is just a coincidence that, just a few days after we published an article about the 1913 Great Lakes Super Storm (see Issue # 921), Algoma got hit with an early and rather nasty preview of things still to come.

The blame for this 'wake up call' actually lies with an intense 'Colorado Low' which brought us days of torrential rain, wild winds and severe thunderstorms that resulted in flooding, road closures and power failures in many parts of the region. The US National Weather Service also issued a tornado watch and flash flood warnings for northern Michigan.

Then, just to make things even more interesting, the torrential rains turned to driving snow! And we all know that there's still much more where that came from!

Each year, about 70,000 collisions occur in the winter months — roughly 30 per cent more than in the summer.

Winter driving can be risky, so be prepared. Here are Transport Canada's Top Ten Tips for winter driving:

1. Get your vehicle ready for winter in the fall.
2. Install four matching winter tires.
3. Carry an emergency kit.
4. Learn and practice winter driving techniques before you need them.
5. Plan your trip; check road and weather conditions before you go.
6. Remove all snow from your vehicle before each trip – especially ALL of your windows and lights.
7. Give yourself extra travel time in bad weather.
8. Avoid using cruise control on slippery roads.
9. Travel with a fully charged cell phone or CB radio.
and perhaps most importantly,
10. SLOW DOWN and WEAR your seatbelt.

Winter is hard on your vehicle. Keep it in top shape by getting a complete check-up of your wipers, battery, ignition system, lights, brakes and exhaust system. Be sure to keep your vehicle topped up with winter washer fluid and carry an extra jug as well.

Perhaps most importantly, think about your tires. They're the only thing between your vehicle and the road, so they need to be good! Check your tire pressures often, especially before any highway driving. Properly inflated, high quality winter

tires will give you best traction on winter roads and increase fuel efficiency.

Remember that a tire that has good pressure when checked in a warm garage will be under-inflated when it is below zero outside - because tire pressure goes down in the cold. That is why you should do your checks when the tires are cold. Use the maximum pressure amount shown in the owner's manual or on the doorframe as a guide, but never go above the pressure shown on the tire sidewall. Check your spare tire pressure regularly. Since having four matching tires improves vehicle handling, don't mix tires with different tread patterns, internal construction and size.

Winter tires have been designed for use in snow. They carry a pictograph on the side-wall of a peaked mountain with a snowflake, meet high standards for winter

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
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traction performance and should not be confused with Mud + Snow (M+S) rated snow tires.

It's best to simply avoid driving in bad weather conditions, but if you must drive, check weather and travel conditions before heading out. Give yourself extra time for travel and, if the weather is bad, wait for conditions to improve. Always tell someone where you are going, the route you plan to take and when you expect to arrive. If you don't arrive on time, and people are worried about your safety, they will know where to search for you. If driving becomes too risky, turn back or look for a safe place to stop until it is safe to drive. Make sure you have enough fuel. Try to keep the fuel tank at least half-full.


Snow and ice are more slippery at 0°C than at -20°C or below. Watch for black ice at temperatures between +4°C and -4°C, where the road surface ahead looks black and shiny. It is often found on shaded areas of the road, bridges and over-passes long after the sun has come out.

With roughly 16,900 km of highway and 2,756 bridges to maintain during the winter, the Province of Ontario uses more than 1,000 snow plows and salt/sand spreaders to keep things moving. The province is adding 50 more trucks this year, with 42 of them being deployed in Northern Ontario. Road salt helps to clear ice and snow until temperatures drop below -12 degrees Celsius. In colder temperatures, sand works best.

Good winter driving is still mostly common sense. Make sure you can see and be seen. Take the time to remove all snow from your vehicle's hood, roof, windows and lights. Clear all windows of frost and fog.

Pack a winter survival kit, "just in case". The Canadian Automobile Association (CAA) recommends that you should keep the following items in your trunk.

- shovel
- sand or kitty litter
- traction mats
- tow chain
- compass
- cloth or roll of paper towels
- warning light or road flares
- extra clothing and footwear
- emergency food pack
- booster cables
- matches and a "survival" candle in a deep can (to warm hands, heat a drink or use as an emergency light)
- fire extinguisher
- extra windshield washer fluid



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

- fuel line antifreeze
 - reflective vest
- Keep the following items inside your vehicle.
- road maps
 - ice scraper and brush
 - flashlight
 - first aid kit
 - blanket (special "survival" blankets are best)

In bad weather, put more distance between yourself and the vehicle in front of you and avoid using cruise control when the road surface is not dry. The danger of skidding is greatest when you are taken by surprise. Since not all vehicles respond in the same way to icy, slippery roads, learn how to handle your vehicle in all types of weather.

Many newer vehicles come with electronic driving aids like Traction Control and Electronic Stability Control systems, which can greatly help you in maintaining control of your car or truck in bad road conditions. Yet helpful as these electronic systems are, they still can't replace simple common sense and careful driving.

Winter isn't all about bad weather, slushy sidewalks and poor driving conditions. Especially in our neck of the woods, it can also be a beautiful, wonderful season, bringing us picture postcard fresh snows, the happy screams from the children on a toboggan, and curling up all snug and cozy by a warm, crackling wood fire.

We just have to be careful to not let our guard down!



Your Wine Glass Helps Determine How Much You Drink

A RECENT JOINT STUDY by Cornell University and the University of Iowa has concluded that the size and shape of a wine glass - and the color of the wine - can greatly influence a drinker's sense of portion control.

Particularly in social settings, many a wine drinker inadvertently overindulges, sometimes unknowingly pouring up to three standard 5 oz. "glasses" of wine into a single wide-stem glass.

In conducting the study, the researchers tested six environmental cues thought to influence perception of liquid volume, including the most obvious: the size of the glass.

Study participants observed by the researchers tended to pour 12 percent more wine into a wide glass versus one of standard size. The study showed that, when assessing volumes, people tend to focus more on the vertical than the horizontal measures. As a result, people usually drink less when drinking from a narrow glass, because they think they're actually drinking more.

The researchers also found that drinkers poured nine percent more wine into a glass when pouring white wine versus red, suggesting that the color contrast of red with the glass improves one's sense of volume being poured.

Their expert advice is simple: If you want to pour and drink less wine, stick to narrow wine glasses and only pour if your glass is on the table or counter and not in your hand. You'll actually tend to pour about 9 to 12% less.

The study did not address similar issues involving beer or spirits, but perhaps one could expect the findings to be similar. Just thought you might like to know!




