

Fibre Internet On The Island?



We've written many articles over the years on "the woes of rural internet," which often got lots of feedback. We have more or less settled on Starlink for our high-speed internet. While it's expensive, it's reliable, user-friendly and has enough speed for us and probably most users. Personally speaking, our issue with Starlink is who owns it. However, last week we were able to attend a meeting at the Hilton Beach Community Hall about true fibre to fibre connections coming to St. Joseph Island, and coming real soon!

The company, PomeGran, held the meeting on

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
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Thursday. Despite arriving 20 minutes early, the hall was already filling up and by the time the presentation began the room was full with people standing at the back. We didn't get a chance to snap a photo of the full hall, but lots of people are clearly interested in what this company will be offering soon.

We touched a little on this service earlier, but this was the first time we got to learn about it in person. So what is currently happening, and happening quickly, is fibre lines are being installed around the power lines

on the island. You may have seen the NIVO trucks out and about doing this work. PomeGran is responsible for infrastructure, not the service itself, which will come through the company NIVO, which is owned by PomeGran. So to be clear, they were not selling anything at the meeting. They wanted consent to string the fibre cables from the poles to your home. In most cases, this would be above ground along the power line to your home, but certain situations would require them to dig a 6 inch deep trench. At this time, they will not be doing any hookups within the home, that will come later.

There is no cost to this installation, as it's being provided by the province, and in our opinion there is no downside to having fibre connected to your home, even if you do not plan to use it. As of right now, the company is seeking permission to hook up every home in the area to the fibre network.

Robert Peace, the representative from PomeGran, stressed that the service would be available first to those who request it. If you weren't at the meeting, you will have to fill out a consent form on their website, so we will post the link on the Island Clippings Facebook page, as it is too long to type out here. While again he wasn't selling a service, he was doing a good job of selling the future service and its viability both here on St. Joseph Island and other rural areas in Ontario. The presentation given in Hilton Beach had been given in Bruce Mines recently and many other areas along the North Shore. The more people who sign up in an area, the quicker the process will go. While several maps of the island were shown, it is possible this will not be 100% island-wide coverage depending on how remote you are.

This project has the support of both the federal and provincial governments, which is how a service like this could be profitable here. The service will be available next year, perhaps as soon as January or March. The only thing holding the project back is red tape from the submarine lines that will connect the mainland to the island which should be resolved shortly.

With the promise of a true fibre connection, that would be good for local economies. It is also a more future-proof compared to other slower services. We personally don't see any reason to not sign up for the free service of adding the lines to the outside of your house. Even if you don't plan on using it now, you may want to later, or the next people who live in your home, or even to speed up installation in your neighbourhood for neighbours. And in the future, having these lines connected to your home may not be covered by the government.



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
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
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ST. JOSEPH ISLAND MUSEUM MOMENT

As autumn's golden days faded and frost settled across the fields, November marked a season of quiet transition for Ontario's early settlers. The bustle of harvest had ended, but life on a pioneer homestead never truly slowed. November was a time of preparation, preservation, and reflection—a bridge between the hard labours of summer and autumn and the long endurance of winter.

By early November, the last of the crops had been gathered. Fields lay bare, often dusted with the season's first snow.

The month was filled with the work of preservation. Women dried fruit, rendered tallow for candles, and made soap before freezing temperatures set in. Pork and beef were salted or smoked, and sausages were hung in cool lofts to cure. Butter was packed tightly in crocks, sometimes layered with salt to be used throughout the winter. Nothing was wasted—every bit of food represented security against the months that lie ahead.

While game was available throughout the year, November was particularly important for hunting deer, wild turkey and smaller game. Meat harvested at this time was either smoked or hung in cold sheds where the cold temperatures naturally preserved it.

Before snow made everything difficult, families worked to make their homes as secure as possible. Cracks in log walls were filled with fresh chinking, roofs were checked for leaks, and cords of wood were stacked high near the door. Fences were mended, wagons greased and stored, and animals given extra bedding in their stalls. The woodpile, in particular, was a symbol of readiness—each log meant warmth and survival.

Before winter froze the ground, November's frequent rain and early sleet often turned roads into deep muddy ruts. This was a critical time of year for completing any necessary travel. Settlers made final visits to gristmills, the general store, blacksmith and post office before the trails became too difficult to navigate.

As daylight hours grew shorter, evenings were spent indoors by the fire. Once major chores were completed families turned their attention to indoor tasks. Women mended clothing, spun wool, or knitted warm mittens and socks. Men repaired harnesses or carved

small wooden toys in anticipation of Christmas. Children helped shell corn, twist flax, card wool or read school lessons by lamplight. The home's hearth became the heart of family life, offering both warmth and companionship against the growing cold. Many settlers described November evenings as some of the cosiest of the year. Time well spent around the fire, telling stories, reading or playing simple games.

The social rhythm of pioneer life shifted in November. With less travel, community interactions took on a more localized form. Work bees, quilting bees, church services and prayer meetings became central to social life offering moments of companionship amid the ever increasing isolation that winter brought.

November was more than the closing of the agricultural year, it was a month that represented a period of transition from outdoor labour to indoor productivity. It was a time to secure the home-stead, care for one another, and take comfort in the fruits of a year's work. As snow began to fall and Christmas drew near, they faced the winter ahead with gratitude, resilience, and the steadfast spirit that defined early settler life.
